

Higdon & Rigg running into state; Rigg sets PR

Sophomore cross country runners Jonah Higdon and Micah Rigg are on their way to compete at the state championship meet on Saturday, November 4th at Lane Community College in Eugene. Each runner earned two medals at the district meet held at Valley Catholic on October 24th; Jonah finished 6th in both the NW League and the district, while Micah finished 7th in the district and 1st in the NW League. To qualify for state, the runners needed to place in the top seven of the district. Higdon crossed the finish line with a time of 18:10, while Rigg finished with a time of 20:10, breaking her previously set school record of 20:27. Higdon and Rigg described the course as, "muddy, slick, and narrow, yet fun and easy." Rigg choose the right time to set her PR in the 5K race, as the girls' event was rather competitive, competing against 1A, 2A, and 3A schools. Sophomore Aiden Durgan also set a

PR, with a time of 22:10, while sophomore Vince Lewis posted his second best time ever, clocking in at 20:48. Seniors Kerrin Higdon and Nicole Ziegler were unable to compete due to injuries.

History of Halloween By: Logan Siler





GRAYSON SPATH




Grayson Spath






