It is difficult to believe, with the weather we have been experiencing, that Spring is just a few weeks away! We are anticipating this will be a very busy spring in our district.

This workbook gives some great visuals about what the new building MAY look like, and establishes a very solid footprint for our new facility. As with any building project there will be many amendments, but I am excited for each of you to take a look at the work we have done this far. In the current phase of Design Development, the architects will hold two days of workshops with staff, students and community stakeholder, in an effort to put even more detail to the plan. Stay tuned for dates of these workshops.

The first earth has been moved concerning the bond work. Our Geo Tech Engineers have begun to dig test pit samples and complete sonic borings. We are on target to begin a site preparation package in June of 2019. This will entail lots of earth work, and foundation development. For those of you in our community, that are interested in pursuing contracted work through this bond project, please contact Misty Wharton. We have begun to build a database of local contractors and laborers who are interested. The board and bond team are committed to employing as many local contractors a possible. We must use the public procurement process, issuing requests for proposals. Our website, under the facilities tab will be a good resource, as well as our bulletin board in our district office. MARCH

This month is a bit of a break in the college and financial aid application process! Students should keep applying for scholarships and make sure their FAFSA information is correct. Most importantly, students need to continue to do well in school – it's easy to start slacking off as a second semester senior but it's important to finish the year strong. Make sure your student knows you expect the best of them in this last push until the end of the year.

1 Keep up the good work.

- Colleges (and scholarship applications) look at second semester grades – so make sure your student continues working hard in school. No slacking!

2 Continue applying to scholarships.

- Continue to encourage and support your student in applying to scholarships.

3 Confirm summer plans.

- Encourage your student to apply for summer enrichment programs, internships or jobs.
- Many college orientation programs take place during the summer, so help students make their plans accordingly.

4 File taxes.

- The deadline for filing taxes is April 15, Financial aid awards are based on your (and your child's) tax information from previous years, so be sure to file on time.

APRIL

If your student hasn't heard from colleges already, this is the month when acceptance letters are sent out. Very exciting! In addition, colleges also send out financial aid award letters that will give the amount of federal, state and institutional money available to your student. **Review the financial aid award letters carefully and ask for help if you have any questions.**

We are so proud of all of our seniors who are making plans for after they graduate – we celebrate all of their accomplishments!

1 Look for decision letters from colleges.

- Celebrate acceptances with your student, and be supportive if he is put on the wait list or denied.

3 Sign up for and attend Preview Days.

- Many colleges have days or weekends specifically for admitted students – your student can take advantage of these to help decide between colleges or get to know one better. Some colleges might offer sessions specifically for parents as well.

2 Compare financial aid award letters.

- Colleges send financial aid award letters soon after sending acceptance letters. Review these carefully with your student and make sure she understands how loans, grants and scholarships work. Compare the cost of attendance and how much aid is given at each school.

4 Decide where to attend college.

- Help your student think through the process and consider all of the factors in choosing a college like distance from home, cost, academics, and more. Be supportive in his final decision and celebrate!
- Many colleges require a confirmation and initial deposit on May 1.


