REGULARLY SCHEDULED BOARD MEETING

STUDENT ENROLLMENT- We are currently serving 500 students in the Nestucca Valley School District. The elementary school has 269 students and the JRSR High has 231. This is the highest the enrollment has been in a decade.

BOND- The first concrete has been poured for the footings of the new double gymnasium. The district was able to submit an Erate grant application that will save the district 64,000.00 in the construction of the new low voltage system. Underground conduit and storm drainage have been laid down. Even with the intense rain we have been having, the construction team has been able to hold to their schedule.

STUDENT SUCCESS ACT (SSA) – Last Monday, February 3, 2020, the district leadership team lead a community input session regarding the SSA. It was shared that the Nestucca Valley School District is predicted to receive \$460,000.00 in the Student Investment Account(SIA). The administrative team will work the next month to complete the SIA application and will plan to present the application at the March Board of Directors meeting.

CTE REVITALIZATION GRANT- The district has been notified by the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) that they have qualified for an interview, with ODE, concerning the \$125,000.00 CTE Revitalization Grant application. This is encouraging!







What is the ORSAA?

The ORSAA is the **Oregon Student Aid Application**, and it serves as an alternative to the FAFSA. The ORSAA is designed for Deferred Action for Childhood Arrival (DACA) students and other undocumented students who are Oregon residents. These students are not eligible for federal aid, but they may be eligible for grants and scholarships administered by OSAC.

To increase their chances of receiving funds, students should file their ORSAA as soon as possible after the application opens on Oct 1 at OregonStudentAid.gov.



Recorder Karate!



What is "Recorder Karate"? It is a positive reward system in which students receive colored "karate belts" to hang from their recorders for each progressively more difficult tune they play for Ms. Stirling. We start with Hot Cross Buns, which is the white belt song, and progress through eight more folk songs, the last being "Ode to Joy".

Students in fourth grade have to "test", or play the song for Ms. Stirling before school or at another time besides music class if they want to participate in Recorder Karate. We currently have three student who have earned their Black Belt this year, Baley Martin, Xyla Rubio, and Roanin Durgan. Students receive a certificate celebrating earning their black belt.



In the Toddler Room we have been working on counting, shape matching and color matching through some guided winter themed games. We have purchased a new curriculum, called High Scope, to help with more developmentally appropriate "curriculum" to individualize learning opportunities. We have a wide range of ages and stages in this classroom and are excited to see more growth in language development and self-regulation.



From *Cookie Debbie*: Just a reminder that good nutrition is so important in child development. Their brain is growing so fast at this age and good eating habits are also learned at school and at home! Having many good choices, children usually choose the healthier foods. Remember to offer lots of fruits and veggies. If you are looking for ways to incorporate healthy eating, let your teachers know. We can plan a family night, introducing some new recipes!

In Head Start, Teacher Ashlee and her team are gearing up for Parent Teacher conferences. 




